History of our School

In 1859, the Community of Christian Brothers first arrived in Omagh following a request from the Bishop of Derry. A field 2 acres and 12 perches in size was purchased at the rear of the Catholic Church in Brook Street for £300.

"The Brothers" in Omagh were tasked with ensuring that: "Education be gratuitous and the admission free." On January 14 1861, the school opened its doors for the first time, with 121 boys presenting themselves for admission.

On May 7, the school was placed under the patronage of Saint Columba and so adopted the title Mount Saint Columba's Omagh Christian Brothers School.

Following on from an extension completed in 1903, the school community continued to grow and, by 1932, a new building was helping to accommodate 125 Secondary School Pupils and 6 teachers (2 Brothers), with the entire site also consisting of 210 Primary School Pupils and 6 teachers (5 Brothers).

The school continued to increase in numbers throughout the 1950s, with 216 Grammar School pupils and 361 Primary School pupils and 16 staff in total by 1955. The Centenary Celebrations of the school were marked during January 1961, with a local housing development being named Centenary Park to mark the occasion.

Work commenced on the new Grammar School during October 1966, with the doors on the Kevlin Road opening for the first time to pupils on 4 September 1967. The school's first MacRory Cup title came in 1974.

In February 1992, building commenced on the development of the new school extension. September 1993 also saw the appointment of the school's first lay principal, Mr Roddy Tierney. By October 1994, the existing school building had been completely refurbished - a new Sports Hall, multi-gym, Music Suite and state of the art Technology Suite completed.

The Millennium year saw the opening of the Sports Complex at Coolnagard and, in 2007, the school captured the Hogan Cup, making the School All Ireland Colleges Champions in Gaelic Football.

The Christian Brothers' Crest

THE STAR in the crest is a reminder that "Those who instruct many to justice shall shine like stars for all eternity". (Dan: 12:13). The star is the symbol of enlightenment and instruction.

THE CROSS is a symbol of Christ, for the Brothers are concerned with the spreading of Christ's Kingdom on Earth.

THE CIRCLE around the cross is a symbol of eternity and of the eternal values to which a Brother is committed.

THE BOOK is a symbol of learning which the Brothers impart to the young. The two Greek letters, Alpha and Omega, remind us that God is our first beginning and last end, that all knowledge begins and ends with him.

THE MOTTO – FACERE ET DOCERE, "to do and to teach" reminds the Brothers that they must live out the Gospel which they preach; they must be "doers" of God's message as well as Bearers, they must lead others by their own example.

CELTIC DESIGN The Christian Brothers Congregation was founded in Ireland in 1802, hence the whole design in the cross, the tracery, the lettering, in conception and execution, is characteristically Celtic and symbolic of our Irish origins.

1861 – The year that the Christian Brothers' School was opened in Omagh, located in the building that is currently the Pastoral Centre.

The School Day

- The school grounds and corridors will be supervised by staff each morning from 8:40am.
- Teaching will begin promptly at 9:00am each morning and all students must be in class by this time.
- Any student arriving late in the morning will sign in at reception and will be marked "Late" on the Register.
- Key Stage 3 lunch begins at 12:25pm and ends at 1:05pm.
- Key Stage 4 & 5 lunch begins at 1:05pm and ends at 1:45pm.
- All pupils must move swiftly to their class when their lunch break ends. Senior students returning late from lunch in town will sign in at reception.
- Students arriving late from lunch will be marked "Late" on the Register.

Absence Procedure

We realise that there may be occasions when a child is sick and unable to attend school. In the event that a child is unfit to attend, we ask that:

parents/guardian contact the school on the first day of absence making us aware that the child is going to be absent and providing a reason for his absence;

If it has not been possible for the parent/guardian to do this, then we ask that:

the pupil provides his Form Teacher with a written note signed by a parent/guardian on the first day of his return. This should be in the form of a note in the Student Planner on the relevant page.



School Development Fund

Parents of each student attending are asked to contribute £60 towards the Christian Brothers 'School Development Fund.'

- For families with two sons attending, the contribution is £100 and
 - For three or more sons it is £120.
- Contributions are collected either:
 - on the first day back to school in September or
 - by Direct Debit by contacting the Bursar.
- Your contributions are used exclusively to benefit the students of this school, providing additional resources and facilities beyond our budget allowance.



School Uniform

Our school uniform is a visible statement of each student's allegiance to this school community. Full uniform must, therefore, be worn at all times and is a condition of each student's daily admission to this school. We ask for your fullest co-operation in ensuring that your son adheres to the uniform regulations.

There will be no deviation at any time from the requirements stated and students who come to school improperly dressed or groomed will not be admitted.

Compulsory School Uniform

- Black blazer with school crest
- Long black trousers cords or jeans are not acceptable
- Light blue shirt with long or short sleeves as preferred
- School tie (only available from school)
- Plain black formal shoes or boots without any decoration
- P.E. Kit (as supplied by the school)

Optional is the Royal blue v-neck jumper

All items of uniform should be clearly labelled with the student's name. Secure lockers are available daily for the storage of personal belongings.

- Students are expected to wear their blazers when moving between classes but may remove them during class.
- Shirts should always be buttoned at the neck and cuffs. Ties should be properly worn.
- T-shirts or vests or other undergarments worn under the shirt should be white and not visible at the shirt collar or cuffs. Students should not wear coloured or printed t-shirts which are visible through their shirts. Short sleeve shirts are allowed but cannot be worn with a long-sleeved undergarment
- Only formal style black leather shoes or boots are acceptable. Trainers or canvas style footwear are not
 permitted. Black shoes or boots are cheaper, longer wearing and, therefore, more cost-effective than expensive trainers or
 runners. No deviation or variation from orthodox black shoes or boots is permitted.

In Addition

- Facial hair is not permitted for students unless a medical certificate indicates a valid reason for it.
- The wearing of earrings, studs or other items of personal jewellery is not permitted.
- The wearing of lapel badges is restricted to those for Prefects, the Student Council, any religious emblems or for any school endorsed charitable cause.
- Students should be neat and tidy in appearance at all times and to have attended to all aspects of personal hygiene.
- Hair should be well-groomed on all occasions. Extremes of hair fashion are not permitted. The dyeing, tinting or highlighting
 of hair is unacceptable.
- In practical subjects, students will be asked to adhere to the required health and safety regulations and, in relation to hair styles, this may require hair nets, caps or bands to be worn, if the teacher considers that the student's hair poses a risk or breach of regulations.
- In cold or inclement weather, students may wear the rain jacket with the school crest or a plain black overcoat with no logos, trademarks or other markings. Other styles of coats, hoodies and half-zips etc. are considered unacceptable.
- Students arriving in school with item(s) breaking school regulations, such as unacceptable coats or outer garments, either wearing or carrying them, will have them confiscated. They may be collected by the student's parents from the Main Office, but items will not be returned to the students.

School Meals Service

We have an excellent cafeteria/restaurant which serves breakfast, mid-morning break and lunch. A "meal of the day" is available each day during lunch and this enables students to purchase both a substantial and healthy meal, at a cost of approximately £2.80.

We have recently upgraded our School Cashless System. Parents can now log onto their son's account to view recent transactions, balances and top up their son's account online.

Restrictions can be set to prevent your son from buying particular food; this is very important in cases of allergies or other dietary conditions, or even just to encourage healthier eating.

If you wish to avail of restriction services, please contact Mrs Marie Donaghy in the school office.

Students who do not avail of the meals service supplied by the School Canteen may bring packed lunches or may avail of our sandwich/snack bar service. These students are supervised in the School Canteen or Assembly Hall at lunch time.



Menu Choice

There is an extensive range of meals and snacks available daily through a series of rotating weekly menus.

All main meal choices and pastries are cooked onsite from fresh ingredients.

The Sandwich Bar enables your son to choose the sandwich, bagel or toastie of his choice from a range of freshly prepared fillings.

These can be pre-ordered for easy collection at lunchtime.



At the Christian Brothers' Grammar School our aim is to promote child health and wellbeing through the Nutritional Guidelines set out by the Department of Education in Northern Ireland.

These guidelines may be found at www.deni.gov.uk and are available upon request.

To maintain a healthy body you should choose:

- Plenty of fruit and vegetables for vitamins A, C and E as well as fibre and with every few calories. Aim for 5 servings a day.
- Plenty of bread and cereals, preferably wholegrain, potatoes for starchy carbohydrate, iron, calcium, B vitamins and fibre.
- Lower fat varieties of milk and dairy foods—for protein, calcium and vitamins A, D and B12.
- Lean and lower fat varieties of meat products, and all varieties of fish in moderation—for protein, iron and B vitamins.



Entitlement to Free School Meals

Application forms for students entitled to free meals are available from the Education Authority.

Free Meals will not be provided for students until the school has received notification from the Education Authority. Parents are reminded that they should complete a renewal form if their son has been receiving free meals during the previous year.

This school operates within the Nutritional Standards for School Meals and other Food Outlets in schools as set out by the Department of Education in Northern Ireland.

Charging Policy (subject to change)

The policy of this school is to charge for:

- · Board and lodgings on residential visits
- Costs associated with the provision of individual tuition on a musical instrument whether inside or outside school hours
 unless it is provided as an essential part of the syllabus for an approved public examination or to meet the requirements of
 Article 11 (1)(b) of the Education Order (1989)
- The costs of entering a student for a non-approved public examination and for preparing the student for that examination outside school hours.
- The cost of entering a student to re-sit an approved public examination and the cost of AS "cash in" in Year 14
- The cost of entering a student for a second approved public examination in the same academic year when preparation by the school enables the student to take more than one examination in that subject (often referred to as double-entry).
- An appropriate charge will be levied for past papers depending on actual cost to each department.
- The cost of any re-scrutiny of examination results if such a re-scrutiny is requested by parents.
- The cost, in cash or in kind, of ingredients or materials needed for practical subjects such as Technology, Home Economics, Engineering, Construction, Hospitality and Art and Design.

For 2023-24, students in Key Stage 3 will be asked to contribute:

- £6 for the cooking supplies being used in Home Economics during the year
- £5 for materials used in projects in Technology
- £3 for materials used in ceramics and textile units of Art

For 2023-24, students in Key Stage 4 will be asked to contribute:

- £6 per term for the cooking supplies being used in Hospitality
- £20 towards the cost of materials for their projects in Technology, Construction and Engineering towards expenses for specialist materials such as ceramics and textiles throughout the year in Art depending on the demands of each unit of work. Those students who complete artefacts made from clay, wood, metal, plastics or fabric that have been provided by the department, will be charged the cost price of the material if or when they take those artefacts home.

For 2023-24, at Post-16 level, students will be asked to contribute

- all additional materials needed for projects in Art
- · all of the materials used in Technology

The student may take home the products produced in Home Economics, Hospitality, Engineering and Technology where the student has contributed partly or wholly for the product. Where no contribution has been made, the product remains the property of the school. In Art, the student is required to provide the finished piece to the school for display in the following academic year.

Optional extra activities which take place wholly or mainly outside school hours and are additional to the education provided by the school for the purposes of preparing students for an approved public examination or for the purposes of meeting the statutory requirements imposed by Article 11 (1)(a) and (b) of the Education Order 1989.

• Participation in any such activities is to be on the basis of parental choice and a willingness to meet such charges as made. A charge will be levied in respect of wilful damage, neglect or loss of property (including premises, furniture, equipment, books or materials) belonging to a third party, where the cost has been recharged to the school. The charge to be the cost of replacement or repair, or such lower cost as the Principal may decide.

For printing or copying costs incurred. Textbooks are provided free of charge, but in some subjects, additional revision guides, past papers, etc are available, for which a charge is made. Lost/unreturned text books will be charged at replacement cost.

We have operate a Cashless system called iPayImpact. We do not take cash at any sale points in the school (canteen, stationery office, main office etc.) and each student will have their finger scanned for iPayImpact.

There are 2 ways of putting money on to your son's account.

- Use our 2 Reval machines; simply place your finger on the pad to activate the account and insert coins and/or notes.
- Online e-payments via your iPayImpact account. Your iPayImpact gives access to spending details and account status.

The Schools preferred method of payment is by using the online e-payment as this can save your son time queuing to add money at the Reval machines and eliminates your son carrying cash to school.

When a purchase is made (e.g. in the canteen) your son will place his finger on the pad which will activate his account, the till operator rings up the items, and the balance on your son's account is reduced by the price of the meal.

- Students who are eligible for the **free school meals** will operate in exactly the same manner as everyone else, the computer will automatically add the free allowance onto your son's account every day.
- Such students can also add their own money onto their account in the normal way.

The School Curriculum

The Christian Brothers' Grammar School, Omagh offers a full school curriculum, including;

- Science,
- Information Communication Technology (ICT),
- Music,
- Languages,
- Art and Design,
- Performing Arts,
- History,
- Geography,
- Religious Education (RE),
- Technology and Design and
- Physical Education (PE).



Our class and homework activities are enhanced with eLearning. Students may utilise resources and activities at any time, with their own personal devices. The school's ICT provision is managed by our IT support team of Kyra Crawford and Chris Eccles. We have ten fully equipped computer suites, multi-media facilities in all teaching areas and clusters of computers in many subject areas. SEN students have access to personal electronic devices.

A well stocked Library is available for use by students throughout the school day.

Two supervised, IT equipped Study Centres are used for Post 16 and after-school study.

Students are able to enjoy our **excellent sporting facilities**, including a large sports hall, a high specification fitness suite and excellent outdoor grass and synthetic football pitches.

Year 8 form classes have 23 or 24 students and are of mixed ability.

The school also offers the following:

- a comprehensive induction programme for entrants at Year 8, Year 11 and Year 13;
- regular pupil reports, parent/teacher meetings and advice evenings;
- teams of teachers involved in Learning for Life and Work/Careers education programmes;
- a mentoring service for all students;
- a learning support programme;
- a School Nurse on duty throughout the school day.



Curriculum Aims

As well as meeting the NI statutory entitlement for curriculum provision, the Christian Brothers' Grammar School aims to ensure its curriculum provision:

- allows every pupil to fulfil his academic potential
- meets the individual learning needs of every pupil
- is diverse, stimulating and tailored to the employment needs of our local and global economy
- develops students' independent learning skills, thinking skills and personal capabilities
- develops a genuine sense of community
- enhances the spiritual, moral and personal development of all students.

An extensive range of subjects are available from Year 8 through to Year 14.

Homework Policy

Homework is an essential part of each pupil's learning experience as it provides opportunities to reinforce classwork, practice and improve a range of skills and develop good practice in independent learning.

Subject departments select types of homework suited to their respective programme of study and the learning needs of pupils. Homework is set on a regular basis and reflects a balance of written, reading, research, practical, learning and revision work.

Coursework & Controlled Assessment Policy

Coursework or Controlled Assessment is defined as work assigned to and completed by a student during a course of study. It is evaluated as part of the student's final grade in the course.

Ensuring the validity of the marks produced from Coursework/Controlled Assessment is vital in maintaining the integrity and reputation of this school in the assessment of its students.

After School Study Support

Our Study Supervisors run an **After School Study Club** every evening from 3:30pm to 4:45pm. It is open to all pupils as a study venue and our Learning Mentor will also be available to work specifically with pupils experiencing organisational difficulties or needing support with study skills, planning and revision.

This will help pupils learn more effectively and improve their achievement.

Assessment and Reporting

Continuous assessment takes place in all subjects throughout the year and supports independent learning. Students must complete all assessments and/or examinations to an acceptable standard before they can be considered for entry to the next year of study. At Key Stage 3, all assessment is teacher-based; many classroom-based, with a final end of year examination.

Full written pupil reports will be issued by the end of the summer term. Reports may include the results of assessment in each of the areas of learning, the Cross-Curricular Skills, and other skills (Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities)
At the end of Year 10, we will assess and report (using the Levels of Progression) on pupil's achievement in Communication, Using Mathematics and Using ICT.

There is also a parent-teacher meeting for every year group where parents can discuss their son's progress in person.

• If a parent has an academic or pastoral query or concern about their son at any time they are welcome to contact the relevant Head of School.

It is expected that students considering Post-16 Studies take a minimum of three subjects from a menu offering A-Levels, Applied A-Levels and BTEC courses.



The selection process is designed to assist your choices and stimulate your aspirations for your Post 16, and involves:

- a post 16 choices evening with a Post 16 prospectus, careers talk and a chance to meet departments,
- ongoing careers advice and
- a final senior teacher choices interview.

In all subjects it is highly recommended that students achieve at least a Grade B if the subject has been studied at GCSE level. Indicated below are the individual subject requirements for study at Post-16 Level.

Omagh CBS has a long-established tradition of achievement, success, quality teaching and learning at Post-16 Level. The special features of Senior School include:

- expert tuition in 26 subjects at A-Level and BTEC.
- a friendly atmosphere where a committed team of teachers and support staff work in partnership with the students.

Post 16 Enrichment Programme


All students at Post-16 will also continue to have one period of Careers and Religious Education per week and will participate in our varied and interesting Enrichment and Outreach programmes.

The School Library

The Library is a vibrant hub of activity at the centre of school life, not only as a classroom which the students visit with their English teacher on a weekly basis, but as the base from which creative imaginations can flourish.



The Library is open at lunchtimes on Monday, Wednesday and Friday throughout each term.

Throughout the year, literary events are held such as:

- The Halloween "Spooker Prize" short story competition in Term One,
- Celebrating famous writers such as "Roald Dahl Day" in September,
- The Christmas Story 2 Minute Tale,
- Celebrating Shakespeare's birthday in April.

Students also undertake word searches, quizzes and find out about the lives and work of these authors and many more!

We also have the 500 words competition which was spearheaded by Chris Evans on BBC Radio Two.

Now in its 5th year, we have had a fantastic response from the Year 8 group, tying in with the English curriculum and maximising students' writing skills in a fun and entertaining manner.

The Library is a focal point in the school, situated just off the main foyer, connecting the Sciences to the Arts.

Come in and seek out the recent releases from your favourite authors, participate in the ongoing events, buy from the book fair, contribute to the Big Book Bonanza or simply enjoy some quiet time, while you dip into one of our wide variety of fiction and non-fiction, avoiding the maelstrom of the school day.



Music

Music is studied by all pupils in Key Stage 3 and it is an optional subject at GCSE, AS and A2 level.

Music tuition is provided in strings and woodwind by the EA peripatetic music tutors. Voice and guitar tuition is provided by independent tutors.

At CBS Omagh, there has always been a strong tradition of Irish traditional music.

The traditional music group enhances many events both in school and outside.

The Music Department provides opportunities for all pupils from Years 8-14 to come together to enjoy and performance music.

Pupils are involved in the preparation of music for the many school liturgies and events.

Over the last number of years our pupils have taken to the stage of the Strule Arts Centre to perform and share their musical talents for their own community in a professional setting.

This has been a wonderful showcase of the excellent musical talents of our pupils and a great opportunity to develop their confidence.





Drama and Performing Arts

Drama and performance have always been facilitated at Omagh CBS not only at Key Stage 3, but across all Key Stages.

The Performing Arts Department offer courses taught in a professional studio environment with access to excellent stage lighting and sound equipment.

Aside from all our curricular courses, the Performing Arts Department boast a wide range of extra-curricular activities such as Speech and Drama Clubs, and an opportunity to participate in workshops, concerts and school productions.

Pupils also have the opportunity to visit the theatre and many other performance or production related venues and institutions.

Most recently, we have opened up a new and exciting opportunity to visit London, a truly engaging educational experience.





Careers Education

All students in the school receive formal careers education.

An Employability programme is delivered to students in Years 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12. Further careers guidance is given to Year 10 and Year 12 students, to assist them in selecting subjects for GCSE and Post-16.

Special attention is given to Careers Education in KS4 as part of Learning for Life and Work.

Year 12 students receive one-to-one guidance from the Northern Ireland Careers Service and also can discuss their own particular queries or concerns with our Careers staff.

Post 16 students are timetabled for a weekly formal Careers class.

The Post 16 careers class allows them to work through the process of selecting their Post-18 pathway and making their UCAS, CAO, college, apprenticeship, or employment applications.

All Year 13s will also undertake work experience.

Additional opportunities for their work experience can be arranged for Year 14 students if required.

A range of career activities is organised for Year 13 students, including workshops, industry talks and lectures by Admissions Tutors from universities throughout the UK and Ireland.

Mock interviews will also be arranged for all students called to interviews for their chosen courses. All students in Year 13 and 14 receive regular one-to-one career guidance interviews.

Each Year 13 student will be assigned to a specific Careers Teacher within the school who will discuss their particular educational and vocational choices on a one-to-one basis.

To complement our Careers teaching staff, we employ a Careers Advisor.

Mrs Martina McCaughey is available for careers advice for students throughout the school day.



All students and/or their parents are encouraged to discuss any Career issues or concerns, they or their son have, with a member of the school's Careers Department.

Pastoral Care

Christian Brothers' Grammar School is dedicated to the provision of a high quality of Pastoral Care to all our pupils.

Parents can be confident in the knowledge that their child will always be educated in a safe and caring environment.

We actively promote a welcoming atmosphere where pupils feel valued and supported. It underpins everything that we do. A range of staff are involved in providing this support for our pupils.

These include:

- A Vice Principal with responsibility for pastoral care and wellbeing;
- **Heads of School and Heads of Year** who will work together to monitor the progress of each pupil across all subjects, identifying and activating appropriate support for pupils experiencing difficulties or at risk of underachievement, maintaining links between the school and home;
- A Learning Mentor who works on a one-to-one basis with pupils who are at risk of underachieving or experiencing difficulties with their motivation or behaviour, liaising also with their parents and teachers to set and monitor targets for improvement;
- Form Teachers who meet the pupils in their registration class every morning and will also meet with pupils from their form class individually during the school year to promote a positive attitude to schoolwork, homework, behaviour, attendance and punctuality.

In order to meet the pastoral needs of pupils more effectively, the school has developed a **Wellbeing Centre** which includes:

- a Learning Mentor;
- a Mentoring Room;
- an after school Study Support facility and
- a lunchtime Games Club.

Learning Mentors

Our Learning Mentors (Louise Maxwell and Anne McCloskey) work closely with pupils who have a Specific Learning Difficulty and also with pupils identified through our pastoral system as requiring support to enable them to overcome barriers to their learning and self-esteem.

Louise and Anne liaise closely with teachers, parents and external support agencies, frequently acting as a supportive link between the family and school.

Mentoring Room

The Wellbeing Centre incorporates a Mentoring Room which is equipped with soft furnishings, tea-making facilities, a television, a Play Station 2 and a Wii console.

It serves a range of purposes during a school week and can be accessed with permission by a pupil who is unwell or upset or even when he just needs some "time out".

Either the Vice Principal, the Learning Mentor or the School Nurse will always be available should a pupil need support during the school day - a friendly face and listening ear will never be too far away!



Learning Support

Special Educational Needs (SEN)/Learning Support has existed in Omagh CBS since 1999, and the school's current SENCo (since 2003) is Mr. Conor McCloskey.



The school maintains an active SEN Register, which includes all students assessed as being at Stage I -Stage 5 of the Code of Practice.

A range of group and one-to-one provision is provided to assist with aspects of study skills, literacy and numeracy, as well as effective social communication.

Significant partnerships have been established with a range of outside agencies to help ensure effective provision for all students on the school's SEN Register, as well as preparation for the forthcoming revised Code of Practice.

A team of teachers provide a range of programmes which aim to support pupils who have learning difficulties.

At present the Learning Support Team, working with the classroom teachers, assists pupils who

- Have hearing or visual impairment
- have a Specific Learning Difficulty
- · have medical conditions which affect their learning
- need extra support in literacy or numeracy
- · have a social and communication difficulty.

What happens in Learning Support?

All Year 8 pupils are assessed in Reading, Spelling and Mathematics.

As necessary, we liaise with relevant external agencies.

Where pupils are identified as requiring extra support, a set of activities is devised which may include any of the following programmes:

- · individual or group tutoring in the areas identified
- paired reading
- Handwriting
- Literacy
- Numeracy.

Counselling Services

All children have their ups and downs and some occasionally have to cope with crises that may arise. While many children cope well enough with difficulties, sometimes problems can mount up and seem too much.

The school has a contract with "Familyworks Independent School Counselling Service" who provide a qualified counsellor one day per week for the school that can support a child going through a difficult time.

This is a confidential service that aims to provide a quiet and reflective time for the child to consider what it is they most need from adults to enable their school life to continue as smoothly as possible. Common issues include family matters such as:

- divorce or separation,
- · death or illness of a family member,
- difficulties in relationships with peers,
- homesickness,
- challenging behaviour

Pupils can refer themselves to the counsellor. If a parent has a concern about their child, they can contact the school directly and speak to the relevant Head of School or Mr White (Vice Principal for Pastoral Care and Wellbeing).



Child Protection

Statement of Commitment and Policy

In the Christian Brothers Grammar School, Omagh, we are committed to the provision of an environment suitable for students to develop and mature, safe, as far as possible, from psychological or physical harm.

All members of staff have a duty to help protect children from abuse or the risk of abuse.

To protect students in its care and to comply with the requirements of the Department of Education for Northern Ireland, this school will refer any concerns about the wellbeing of its students to the local Social Services Department.

This school has a **Designated Teacher**, Mr Anthony White and a deputy designated teacher Mr Ciaran McBride, who deal with child protection issues.

Anti-Bullying

This school also seeks to ensure that bullying is identified and dealt with so that any harm caused by other students can be minimised. All students are encouraged to show respect for others. Parents are expected to help children to behave in non-violent and non-abusive ways.

As part of our pastoral duty, staff must take all reasonable steps to ensure that the welfare of all students is safeguarded and that their safety is preserved. This school defines bullying as "deliberate psychological or physical hurt caused to an individual by the behaviour of another that is unprovoked and repeated over a period of time."

This school will not tolerate bullying behaviour and actively promotes an anti-bullying ethos. It strives to protect the basic right of each student to receive his education free from intimidation and fear and to this end the school has adopted a set of procedures to deal with instances of bullying in a consistent manner. It applies to relationships between pupils in the school and between pupils and members of staff. Any student or parent who is aware of bullying behaviour is actively encouraged to report the matter immediately to either the relevant Form Teacher, Head of Year, Head of School or Vice Principal. All allegations of bullying will be taken seriously and investigated as speedily and thoroughly as possible. Any pupil found to have engaged in bullying will be dealt with in accordance with the school's Anti-Bullying Policy which is modelled on recommendations made by the Northern Ireland Anti-Bullying Forum.

The additional support of a school mentor/counsellor to work with the pupil exhibiting bullying behaviour and/or the target of the bullying behaviour will be enlisted if deemed necessary.

This is a brief summary of the school Anti-Bullying Policy. Copies of the full policy are available from the Main Office.



School Nurse

The school employs a nurse who is on duty throughout the school day to provide the general medical support which students may require.

Pupils may attend the Medical Room during break and lunch times for more routine treatments but may visit the Medical Room during class as required and with the permission of their subject teacher.

All visits to the Medical Room will be recorded, with date, time, problem and action taken by the School Nurse.

Pupils should not be sent to school when they are unwell, particularly when they may infect other pupils. Parents should contact the nurse if their sons contract a particularly infectious illness such as Mumps, Glandular Fever, etc..

Except in extreme emergencies, the nurse is unable to accompany pupils to the hospital. In the event of pupils requiring emergency attention from the hospital, the school will telephone to make an arrangement with the contact person/persons indicated in the pupil's record.

As an important part of our records, we need to record the medical details and/or special needs of all our pupils (e.g. diabetes, epilepsy, asthma). Therefore, it is essential that parents complete the relevant form at the start of each academic year to allow us to record all the necessary details.

These details may be required by the School Nurse if students become ill at school.

Parents are encouraged to contact the School Nurse if they wish to discuss any aspect of their child's health.

The School Nurse can be contacted at any time during school hours.



Consideration for the rights of others and good manners are primary responsibilities for all members of the school community. We can teach Positive Behaviour to our students and above all, model it in ourselves, thereby increasing the likelihood of the best social and educational outcomes for our students.

This means insisting on the highest standards of behaviour at all times i.e. punctuality, manners, courtesy, uniform, and the highest standards of work, rewarded appropriately.

It is the responsibility of the Classroom Teacher, Form Teacher and Head of Year and Head of School to implement the agreed Positive Behaviour policy.

The Head of School and Head of Year will review student progress liaising with the Pastoral Care Team and Learning Support Department.

Where breaches of school guidelines occur, the school operates an escalating stage warning system which incorporates on-going communication between parents, pupils and the school.

If a pupil is persistently in breach of school or classroom guidelines he may be referred for one-to-one support to the school's mentoring service which is managed by the Vice Principal.

We appreciate and anticipate parental support in the application of the Positive Behaviour Policy to ensure that the highest standards of behaviour are adhered to at all times. The system will encompass rewards and sanctions.

Rewarding Participation and Achievement

We feel it is important to recognise and reward the achievements of students in all areas of school and community life.

Students learn effectively and make progress in a positive learning

environment, one which is supportive and encouraging.

A positive reward system operates independently of negative behaviour and will serve to recognise positive achievements or participation within the classroom, school and local community.

It is intended to actively promote high standards of work and active participation in both school and community life.

There are a number of ways in which the school will recognise student achievement and participation.

The Positive Behaviour Points System is where students can accumulate positive points on a class by class, weekly, monthly and term basis. Students can receive points for participation/achievement in the following areas: attendance, punctuality, effective use of their planner, work in class, homework, extra-curricular participation and community participation.

Examples of extra-curricular participation that students can earn points for include, but are not limited to, Superleague participation, charity work, peer tutoring, open day duties, weekly clubs, assisting and organising events, representing the school or bringing credit to the school in areas such as sports, drama or music.

Students can also receive points for community participation such as membership of clubs and charity/community/parish work carried out outside school.

Rewards

- **'Student of the Month' Awards** each month the **five** students in each class who have received the most positive points will receive a reward.
- Rewarding Achievement trips will also be held at the end of the school year.
- Rewarding Achievement Prize Giving Ceremonies are held twice in the school year to recognise students' high achievement and consistent effort.

We are committed to rewarding of achievement and participation both within and beyond the curriculum, and will, therefore, award positive points and rewards accordingly. We monitor and review our **Rewarding Achievement Policy** to ensure it continues to motivate and reward students.



Visits and Competitions

All students are offered the opportunity to develop their understanding and enjoyment of the curriculum through participating in a wide range of educational visits and competitions.

- Irish Trips to Glenveagh National Park
- English Trip to London

CBS Student Council

Our students have an important contribution to make to the effectiveness of the school in meeting their needs and giving them a responsible voice.

Superleague


For students who prefer outdoor activities, a Superleague competition runs during lunchtimes where classes in each year group will compete against each other in Gaelic football or soccer.

Sports and Physical Education

Physical Education (PE) is delivered to all students from Year 8 to 14.

The official school PE kit, consisting of jersey, shorts and socks is compulsory for all students in Year 8, 9 and 10.

In the interests of **health and safety,** football boots with metal blades are prohibited on all playing surfaces and those with metal studs are prohibited on the astro-turf pitch.

Electronic Devices, eLearning & eSafety

Policy on the use of Electronic Devices

Students are advised that any personal electronic devices, if brought into school, may only be used in adherence to the strict guidelines as set out in the 'Electronic Devices Policy' and in a manner consistent with the school's 'Acceptable Use Policy.'

The teaching and learning environment must not be disturbed through the use or misuse of personal electronic devices

Within the school environment students are permitted to:

- use personal electronic devices for teaching and learning purposes as advised by a teacher.
- use personal electronic devices during morning break and during lunch break to, for example, listen to music or play age appropriate games.
- use personal electronic devices during morning break and during lunch break to check on receipt of messages or telephone calls to the electronic device but not to reply to them. If necessary, teacher permission may be sought in an emergency.

Within the school environment, students are prohibited from:

- using any personal electronic device, including a mobile telephone, to message others or make or receive telephone calls.
- recording or publishing/displaying media (audio/video/images) on any personal electronic device at any time unless instructed or permitted to do so by a teacher during a teaching and learning activity.
- using a personal electronic device including a mobile telephone to access the Internet or any 'cloud' based storage for any purpose at any time unless instructed or permitted to do so by staff as part of a teaching and learning activity.

Internet safety depends on staff, school, governors, advisers, parents and, where appropriate, pupils themselves taking responsibility for the use of internet and associated communication technologies.

School access is denied for unmoderated chat rooms, gaming areas or areas of inappropriate material.

Fair rules, clarified by discussion and prominently displayed, will help pupils make responsible decisions.

At home, parents should reinforce such fair advice and restrictions by discussing eSafety with their children and monitoring:

- sites accessed by their children;
- inappropriate use of internet,
- Safe setup of social media apps.

Parents are advised to supervise their child's use of the internet at home at all times. There is no right answer to an effective solution for this developing technology.

Staff, parents and pupils must remain vigilant to ensure safety of access and use.


